Criteria:

- A. Attendance Absences (excused or unexcused) that number 20 or greater for the academic year will put a student in consideration for retention.
- B. Academic Success in Core Classes All students must pass Language Arts, Math, Science and Social Studies. The class yearly academic average must be 60 or above to be considered passing.
- C. Academic Success in Elective Classes Students must pass at least 50% of their elective classes for the academic year.
- D. Academic Success on End of Grade Tests Students are expected to pass both the Math and Reading EOGs (with a 3, 4 or 5)and Science EOGs in Grades 5 and 8 in order to move to the next grade level. EOG scores are not the sole determinant of promotion or retention.

What is my child learning at school? How can a parent review these materials?

Parents are encouraged to be an active part of their student's educational career here at Lakeside Charter Academy. This can begin by attending Open House/Meet the Teacher Night in August and Curriculum Night in September to learn about curriculum and expectations. Beyond that, LCA offers parents access to Google Classroom as well as the PowerSchool Parent Portal to track student academic progress. Google Classroom provides access to upcoming assignments, classroom calendar, reminders of upcoming events, etc. This platform also provides access to student assignments and classroom materials for parent review. K-2 teachers generally offer weekly newsletters that share upcoming learning activities and topics so families can be plugged into their child's learning experiences.

How will a parent learn about my child's progress in school or with a class?

How can I support my student's learning?

PowerSchool is available for families to engage and monitor their student's learning progress, including grades. Teachers will also post important messages to families about expectations and upcoming assignments utilizing the tool. Hard copies of progress reports go home to parents every 4.5 weeks and report cards go home quarterly. Parent Teacher conferences are held annually in the fall and spring. All parents are encouraged to attend. Additionally, by partnering with the school on the following learning habits, students will be best set up to be successful.

Establish a Consistent Routine:

Create a daily schedule that includes dedicated time for homework, reading, and other learning activities. Consistency helps children feel secure and develop good study habits.

Create a Quiet and Organized Study Space:

Designate a quiet area where your child can focus on their schoolwork without distractions. Keep essential supplies, such as pens, pencils, and notebooks, readily available.

Encourage Regular Reading:

Foster a love for reading by providing a variety of age-appropriate books. Set aside time for family reading, and discuss the stories with your child to enhance comprehension and critical thinking skills.

Engage in Conversations:

Regularly talk with your child about their school day. Ask open-ended questions to encourage them to share their experiences, challenges, and successes. This helps build strong communication skills.

Support Homework Efforts:

Be available to assist with homework when needed. Offer guidance, but allow your child to work independently as much as possible. This helps build self-confidence and problem-solving skills.



Embrace Technology as a Learning Tool, but Cultivate Balance:

Utilize educational apps, online resources, and interactive tools to enhance your child's learning experience. Be involved in exploring these tools together.

Promote a Healthy Lifestyle:

Encourage regular exercise, a balanced diet, and adequate sleep. Physical well-being directly impacts cognitive function and concentration.

Attend Parent-Teacher Conferences:

Stay informed about your child's progress by attending parent-teacher conferences. Collaborate with teachers to address any concerns and explore ways to further support your child's learning.

Foster a Growth Mindset:

Encourage a positive attitude toward challenges and learning from mistakes. Emphasize the importance of perseverance and resilience in the face of difficulties.

Cultivate Curiosity:

Explore your child's interests and engage in activities that spark their curiosity. This helps create a passion for learning and broadens their educational horizons.

What are the qualifications of my child's teachers?

LCA desires all of its teachers to be certified by the State of North Carolina or, at minimum, highly qualified and on the pathway to certification. To become a certified teacher, individuals typically need to meet certain qualifications and follow a set of steps. Please note that certification requirements may change, and it's always a good idea to check with the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction (NCDPI) for the most up-to-date information.

	 Earn a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution. The degree should be related to the subject area or grade level the individual intends to teach. Teacher Preparation Program: Complete an approved teacher preparation program. This program is often part of the bachelor's degree in education. Student Teaching Experience: Gain practical classroom experience through student teaching. This is typically a required component of the teacher preparation program. Testing Requirements: Pass the required exams. In North Carolina, this often includes the Praxis Core Academic Skills for Educators (CORE) tests and specific Praxis Subject Assessments for the desired teaching area. Background Check: Undergo a criminal background check. A clean background is usually a requirement for teacher certification.
What are the requirements for school enrollment?	As mandated by our Charter from the State of North Carolina, open slots are filled through a lottery. Any applications received after the lottery application deadline (which is in February) will be placed at the end of the waitlist of the grade applied, in the order of receipt. Typically, applications are not accepted and new students will not be admitted after the 40th school day. Once a child is accepted through the lottery process, they will receive a communication from the school about registration (birth certificate, two proofs of residency, immunization, school documents (2 years EOG, grades, etc.) and any special education information, if applicable) More information about the lottery process and enrollment can be found by viewing our Lottery Policy,



How can a parent help their child develop citizenship, social skills and respect for others?
